The City of Cresson was incorporated in November of 2001 and the first city council was elected in 2002. The first city limits encompassed two square miles with a half a mile ETJ. Cresson's city limits and ETJ now includes 33 square miles.

This little town has grown from a phone company operated by one man named Chapel Bryant to hardly anyone having their LAN lines in their homes. Most of us only use our cell phones! My mom always said that Chapel knew everyone's business! But if you were answering all those switchboard calls, you would, too!

The best candy bars given out at Halloween were from Chapel's son and daughter-n-law, Fred, and Francis Bryant. They did not have children and I always thought that is why they gave out the full-size candy bars. They were also generous to our local Cresson Methodist Church.

Whenever I attend Cresson's Fall Festival annually, I always remember the celebrations held at the historic school of which the best food was always served. There were talent shows that I have written about in previous columns, but truly the "Beatles' and "Phyllis Diller" performances were my favorites.

The stage at the historic school is still in fine condition and was home to many plays. Local residents, Matt Miles and Jacque Teich Keeney joined this Mayor in the production of Snow White. Joe Long also played a big part in this play. Joe's mom, Helen Long, was instrumental is getting the historic school reopened as a Community Center. She was our 4-H Leader as well. Helen had a servant's heart.

Cresson is growing, but for some for us, it will always hold those childhood memories that make it special to us. Never did we think there would be a private airport here or a fast-food restaurant. As we get closer to the opening of the latest new restaurant, The Cresson Wrench, it's exciting to dream of getting delicious food and drinks from residents, Bambi and Ronnie Bridges! If you haven't driven by, take a turn to the right at the red light onto Highway 171 headed to Godley, and drive by and see all the artwork that the owners have had done on their fences. It's truly spectacular!

Sometimes I wonder when will the first electric vehicle charging station arrive to our community? Will we even have gas stations? My youngest son, Cole, used to be truly fascinated by the notion of flying cars. If we can go to Mars, we can probably see a flying car in our future.
